North East ISD delays 2011 bond proposal



On Mar. 7, 2011, during a special board meeting, the North East ISD Board of Trustees voted unanimously to postpone the bond election that would have been held in May 2011. The great uncertainty for public education funding is what prompted the Board to make their decision. The election will be postponed until a time when more information from the Texas Legislature is available and will support a bond election.

“The work put in to develop and plan this bond has been very good and worthwhile,” said Richard A. Middleton, NEISD superintendent of schools. “We have done a great job at reducing our budget. This postponement will give us the opportunity to restructure the bond so that it will exactly fit the needs of the district in response to legislative decisions.”

District staff and board members were hoping to have received

definitive input on legislative decisions for public education funds by now; however, that information will likely not be available until late May or June. While figures are not finalized, the district’s estimates today are that it will lose anywhere from \$40 to \$60 million in state funding from its budget for the next two years.

On Feb. 28, 2011, the Board called a bond election for \$399,410,000 for the May 2011 ballot. The bond issue was recommended by the Community Planning and Advisory Committee made up of North East residents and addressed growth, facility equity and additions, a school bus replacement program, a technology upgrade package, and a new middle school. All research and community feedback on these projects will be maintained as the community planning process for a potential bond election in the future continues. The group has already met once on Mar. 24 to discuss the delay and future of this bond proposal.

Cibolo Green Elementary earns Gold Level LEED certification



The Gold Level LEED certification earned by Cibolo Green was announced at the school’s dedication ceremony on Feb. 27. Among the invited guests were Superintendent of Schools Richard A. Middleton, Board of Trustee President Beth Plummer and Cibolo Green Principal Ivonna Gonzales.

Green initiatives promote environmentally and fiscally responsible facilities since they protect our natural resources and save the district money over the years because of reduced maintenance and operating costs for the facilities. For this reason, sustainable “green” buildings techniques that are fiscally responsible and promote healthy learning environments will be incorporated into future construction projects.

Cibolo Green Elementary, which opened in August 2010, was recently notified by the United States Green Building Council (USGBC) that it earned “Gold” certification under the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) for Schools certification system. It is the first “Gold” elementary school in Bexar County and South Central Texas. In fact, as of this publication, there are only two other “Gold” schools in the state.

LEED is an internationally recognized green building certification system which verifies that facilities are designed and constructed using strategies that improve energy efficiency, water conservation, and indoor environmental quality, in addition to utilizing natural resources and reducing CO2 emissions.

Green design also incorporates local/regional materials into the building structure. The school used natural Texas sedimentary rock. Special limestone called Cardova Shell, that showcases marine fossils from the ancient Texas seas, was selected by Cibolo Green Principal Ivonna Gonzales as both an architectural element and learning tool.

District wins Indoor Air Quality award from Environmental Protection Agency


North East ISD was awarded the Model of Sustained Indoor Air Quality (IAQ) Excellence Award from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Office of Radiation and Indoor Air. NEISD received the award through its participation in the EPA's Tools for Schools program and for demonstrating a sustained commitment to indoor air quality management and promoting student and staff health, performance and productivity.

"IAQ management was never a

question, it was an answer," said Richard A. Middleton, NEISD superintendent of schools. "It supports the health of our students, so they can attend school and meet their full potential -- and it supports the health of our staff, without whom educating students is impossible."

Without good indoor air quality, students and staff face serious health risks in schools that can lead to asthma attacks, decreased performance and diminished concentration.

NEISD fine arts students selected among best in the nation

The United States Presidential Scholars Program recognizes and honors some of our nation's most distinguished graduating high school seniors. This year, several of North East ISD's students were among those being considered for this prestigious honor.

Students across the country have the opportunity to become Presidential Scholars in two areas: Academics and the Arts. Each year, up to 141 students are named Presidential Scholars based on their artistic and academic achievements. Of these, approximately 20 are named U.S. Presidential Scholars in the Arts. This year -- in addition to two academic candidates -- NEISD had three candidates selected for the Arts program out of approximately 7,000 applicants across the country.

Brooke Bowman, 18 and Kelsey Godfrey, 18, of Reagan High School were selected in the area of spoken theatre, while Joshua Taliaferro, 18, of Johnson High School was selected in musical theatre. They were three of only four Texas candidates invited to move on in the selection process. This speaks to the quality of the fine arts program in the district, and, most importantly, to the students' love of the craft.

Part of being selected to advance, was an invitation to Miami, FL in January to participate in Young Arts Week sponsored by the National Foundation for Advancement in the Arts. There, they joined 150 other fine arts students from across the country to participate in classes with internationally renowned artists, workshops, performances and exhibitions. When asked about the trip, all three immediately said the same thing. "It was the best week of my life."

"It was a critical juncture in my path as an artist," added Taliaferro. "I got there and immediately we hit the deck with workshops and rehearsals."

Participants of Young Arts Week represented nine disciplines including dance, jazz, music, photography, cinematic arts, theatre, visual arts,

voice and writing. During the day, they participated in one-of-a-kind training, and culminated the week with a showcase of everyone's work.

"The whole week was very interdisciplinary," said Bowman. "We got to experience everyone's craft. It was beautiful to see everyone there share the same love of the arts."

NEISD has always supported a 360-degree education for its students. This means that in addition to providing core course work, such as math, history and English, students are given the opportunity to grow in areas like athletics, fine arts and the Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC). These types of activities teach leadership, responsibility, dedication and commitment -- traits that will benefit them in the classroom, as well as give them a competitive edge in the job market.

Perhaps one of the greatest benefits of the students' experience in fine arts at NEISD, was being able to discover and cultivate a passion that will carry them throughout life.

"As cliché as it sounds, I really didn't choose theatre," said Bowman. "Theatre chose me. Nothing else has given me the fire that theatre does."

"I didn't have a moment where I knew I loved theatre," said Godfrey. "It was just always in my blood. I know I'll be acting somewhere or doing something in theatre. That's all I want to do."

For Taliaferro, he hopes to pursue formal theater training and give back by helping to instill a love of the arts in future generations of children.

After returning from Miami, Bowman learned that she advanced to the next level of competition and won a scholarship to participate in Young Arts Week in New York. The 20 National Arts Scholars for 2011 will be selected from this group of students and have the opportunity to perform at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in June. That announcement will be made in May.

Bush and Bradley named Schools to Watch

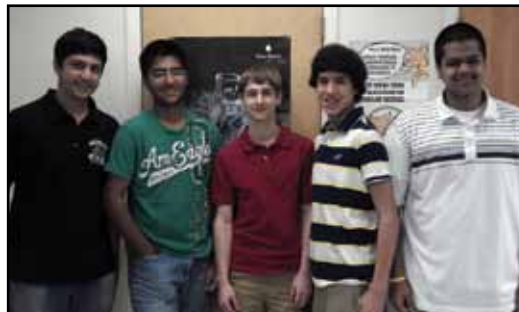

Tech Spotlight: Middle school programmers win \$7,000 grant



The Android Programming class at Krueger Middle School won a \$7,000 grant from Rackspace Hosting for laptops and development devices.

This grant will help the students learn to program mobile applications and sell them by publishing to the Android market.

“Although students can learn to program for Android using free software development tools, this physical hardware makes working with key concepts much more accessible,” said Programming Teacher Andrew Beck.

Students now have access to a small number of dedicated programming laptops, which they will be able to check out if they wish to work on their applications at home.

District launches new Parent Portal mobile service



Recently, North East ISD launched a new Parent Portal Mobile service. This tool makes it easier for parents to monitor their child’s progress in school all through the web browser on their mobile device.

NEISD created the Parent Portal Mobile service as another communication tool to help parents become more involved with their child by providing a virtual window into the classroom. Parent Portal Mobile is like having a daily progress report from each teacher. Parents can currently use the portal to e-mail teachers; check grades on assignments, tests and quizzes; receive alerts on grade averages, food service accounts and immunizations; monitor any unpaid fines; and view attendance records.

For parents to access Parent Portal Mobile, log into portal.neisd.net with your Parent Portal user name and password. If you do not have a Parent Portal account and would like to use Parent Portal Mobile, first go to portal.neisd.net from your computer and click on “parent registration.”
