Student Performance

- ★ North East had 21 National Merit Semifinalists, 53 Commended Scholars, 62 Hispanic Scholars and 3 Achievement Scholars for the 2009-2010 school year.
- ★ In 2008-2009, North East's average SAT score was above the state and national averages. Overall, the district's composite average score was 41 points higher than the state composite average and 17 points higher than the national composite average.

School Accountability

- ★ North East is one of the largest district in the state to be rated Recognized. In addition to its 28 Exemplary schools, the district had 25 Recognized and 10 Academically Acceptable campuses for 2009.
- ★ To achieve these high ratings, students in the district outperformed the state on the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS).
- ★ In 2007, North East had the highest four-year graduation rate (90 percent) of all the large school districts in Bexar County.

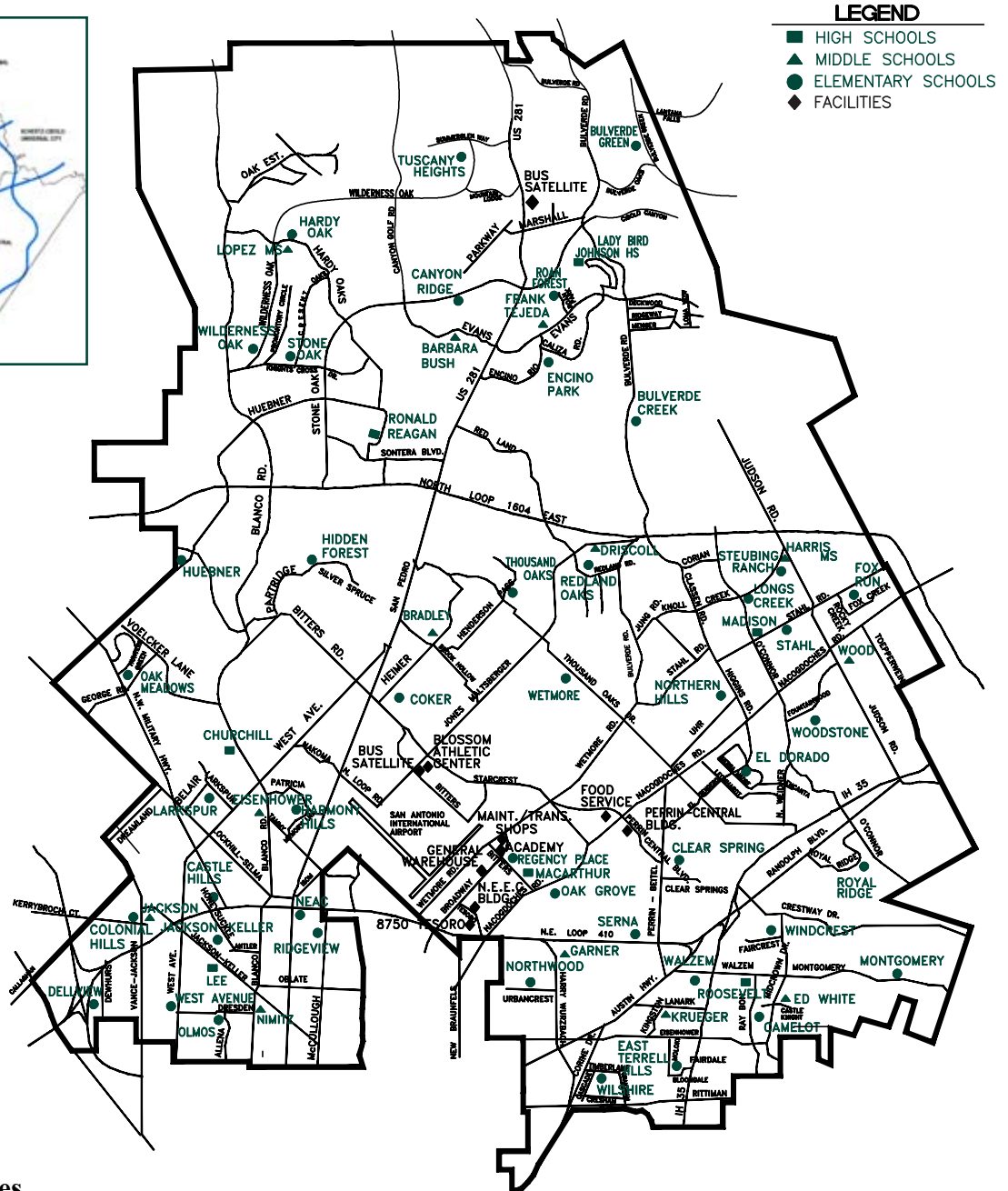
Student-focused Technology

- ★ More than 35,000 students are currently represented by a parent or student portal account, which is more than 50 percent of the district's population. The Parent Portal is a secure Web site that provides information on grades, attendance, immunizations, food service accounts and more.
- ★ As part of the 2003 bond program, the district installed security cameras at all high school campuses. The 2007 bond will fund cameras for all remaining schools. Recorded and live images can be viewed from administrators' computers, adding another layer of safety for North East students.

District Boundaries

North East ISD is the second largest school district in the San Antonio area. It spans approximately 144 square miles in the north central and northeast sectors of Bexar County. The majority of the district lies within the boundaries of the city of San Antonio, but several smaller communities are also encompassed within North East ISD, including the cities of Castle Hills, Hill Country Village, Hollywood Park and Windcrest. Accreditation

All campuses in North East ISD are fully accredited by the Texas Education Agency. For 2009, the district had 28 Exemplary schools. The U.S. Department of Education bestowed the No Child Left Behind - Blue Ribbon Award to three North East high schools in 2000, three elementary schools in 2001, two elementary schools in 2007 and one elementary school in 2008. In addition, North East boasts a National Exemplary Community Education Program.

New Student Registration

Children who reside within the boundaries of the North East Independent School District are eligible for enrollment in district schools. The district does not accept tuition students from outside of its boundaries. Some North East magnet schools accept qualifying out-of-district students. If you cannot determine your campus from the information on the boundary page of our Web site, please call Community Relations at (210) 804-7090.

Registration Requirements

- Proof of residency
- Current immunization record
- Birth certificate
- Social Security card
- Report card from previous school (if applicable)

Parents or legal guardians are to take these items to their assigned campus to complete registration.



Immunizations

State Law and North East ISD policy require medically validated up-to-date records of immunizations to be on file for all students. Immunization records must be as complete as medically feasible. To claim exclusions for medical reasons or reasons of conscience, including a religious belief, please contact the school nurse or North East ISD Health Services at (210) 804-7147. A listing of immunization requirements can be found at Health Services page of district Web site, or with the school nurse.

Rules for Kindergarten and First Grade

According to State law, a child who has reached five years of age on or before Sept. 1 of the current school year is eligible to attend kindergarten. Children enrolling in first grade must also be six years of age by Sept. 1 of the current school year. A student who is five years of age on or before Sept. 1 of the current school year and has completed public school kindergarten in another state or is enrolled in a public school first grade class in another state may continue in the first grade if he/she moves into North East ISD during the school year. Capped Schools

The population growth north of Loop 1604 has caused North East to restrict the enrollment (capping) of new students in some or all grade levels at certain schools. Additional NEISD schools may be capped at one or more grade levels if they reach capacity. For more information on capped schools, call Pupil Personnel Services at (210) 804-7070.

Transportation

Transportation is available for children who live two miles or more from their assigned school. The distance a student lives from their assigned school is measured using the shortest route that may be traveled on publicly maintained roads between the entrance to the campus and the property line of the student's legal residence. Students residing within two miles of their assigned school may have transportation available if their neighborhood qualifies as hazardous under the district's hazardous transportation rating system. Pre-Kindergarten Program

Half-day Pre-Kindergarten is available for children who meet certain criteria for enrollment. A child must be 4 years of age on or before Sept. 1 of the school year. The child must live within the North East ISD boundaries. He or she must also have all current and required immunizations on or before the first day of school.

Parent Portal

The North East ISD Parent Portal is a secure Web site that gives parents information about their child's daily performance at school. Through the Internet, parents can access information about their students at any time and place. This tool helps parents be more involved with their child by providing a virtual window into the classroom. Parents can use the portal to e-mail teachers; check grades; link to the library portal and teacher Web pages; receive alerts on grade averages, low or missing assignment grades, food service accounts, and immunizations; view district and campus event calendars; and view class attendance history and discipline referrals for misconduct. After School Program (KIN)

The Kids' Involvement Network (KIN) is the district's after-school program with sites at every North East elementary and middle school campus with close to 7,000 students served annually. KIN has been recognized by the National Community Education Association, the Texas Community Association and USA Today as an Outstanding After-School Program. The program is in operation from the time school dismisses until 6:00 p.m. every day school is in session. Financial assistance applications are available through the KIN office. Report Cards

Each school year is divided into two semesters. Each semester consists of two nine-week grading periods. The weighted average of the two semester grades and the semester exam determines the yearly average. Report cards provide the student and parents/guardians a cumulative report of the student's progress in each course in which he/she is enrolled. Report cards are sent home at the end of each nine-weeks period.

School Nutrition Services

The meals served in every North East ISD school provide a healthy balance of vitamins and minerals to help meet the dietary needs of our students. The district's School Nutrition Services department offers online prepayments for your child's cafeteria meal account by accessing www.MyLunchMoney.com. You will need your student's name, ID number and birth date to access your account. A fee of \$1.95 is charged for each transaction. Middle and high school students are not permitted to run a negative balance on meal accounts. You can also access a student's cafeteria account through the Parent Portal on the district Web site at www.neisd.net.





Parent Information

School Choice

The Texas Education Code establishes the opportunity for a parent to request his/her child be transferred to another school within the district other than the one assigned for the residence. North East ISD does its best to accommodate families' requests. Three factors impact the district's School Choice procedure: a limited number of seats available at each campus for students; the Board of Trustees' goal for students to attend neighborhood schools; and significant growth in many areas of the district. For these reasons, there is no guarantee that submitting a School Choice application will result in the transfer of the child to the requested school for the beginning of the following school year. Special Education

The Department of Special Education is committed to meeting individual students' needs through communication and collaboration among general education staff and special education staff and parents. An array of instructional services is provided to allow learning in an environment that is most appropriate and least restrictive. Identification programs include referral/screening and/or individual assessments to determine educational, psychological, vocational, speech, visual, audiological and physical needs. Special Education services are available at every campus.



Gifted and Talented Program

The purpose of the North East Gifted and Talented (G/T) program is to facilitate the optimal development of each student's intellectual and creative gifts and talents. This includes producing the highest level of adaptive problem solvers and perceptive thinkers, creating highly effective communicators, guiding learners to be focused and self-directed, creating self-actualizing citizens, and nurturing in-depth interpersonal and interpersonal potential. Teachers, parents, counselors or administrative personnel may nominate students for the G/T program. Contact your school's G/T teacher at the elementary level or counselor at the secondary level for more information.

Dress Code

It is our professional belief that school performance and future success are enhanced by appropriate dress and grooming. Parents/guardians are strongly urged to work closely with the school to ensure their child's adherence to high standards of dress and grooming expected in the North East ISD.

Some NEISD elementary and middle schools have adopted uniform requirements. The following is a list of these campuses: East Terrell Hills, Ridgeview and Walzem elementary schools; and Driscoll, Eisenhower, Garner, Jackson, Krueger, Nimitz, White and Wood middle schools. Tradition of Elementary School Curriculum *Excellence*

Core Content Instruction

As outlined in the Texas Education Code, the required curriculum consists of foundation and enrichment subjects. The foundation subjects include English Language Arts and Reading, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies. They are based on the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS). Instructional timelines have been established in North East ISD that cover the scope and sequence of study for each grade level and subject. Students participate in the district's assessment process as part of their instructional program. This assessment process is designed to diagnose students' strengths and weaknesses, determine instructional effectiveness, guide instructional decisions, and identify programmatic strengths and weaknesses.



State Assessments

The Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) program is designed to measure the extent to which a student has learned and is able to apply the defined knowledge and skills at the tested grade level. Every TAKS test is directly aligned to the TEKS and is administered at the following grade levels:

Grade	Test Administration
3 (English and Spanish)	Mathematics and Reading
4 (English and Spanish)	Writing, Mathematics, and Reading
5 (English and Spanish)	Mathematics, Reading, and Science

TAKS includes accommodated, modified and alternative forms for students served by special education who meet the eligibility requirements as identified through the Admission Review Dismissal Committee.

Limited English Proficient students are administered state-identified English language proficiency assessments annually in listening, speaking, reading and writing as identified through the Language Proficiency Assessment Committee.

A major component of the TAKS testing program is the grade advancement requirements of the Student Success Initiative, which ties performance on TAKS to grade advancement at grades five and eight.

ALSO IN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL...

Dual Language

The Dual Language Program is a language immersion program at 11 NEISD elementary schools. Dual language classes may be comprised of one-half native Spanish speakers and one-half native English speakers. It begins in kindergarten and when students complete the program in fifth grade, they have high levels of proficiency in English and Spanish.

Bilingual Program

The Bilingual Program is available at 11 NEISD campuses. It enables Limited English Proficient students to become competent in the comprehension, speaking, reading and composition of the English language.

Middle School Curriculum

Core Content Instruction

North East students in grades six through eight are provided instruction in both foundation and enrichment subjects. The foundation subjects include English Language Arts and Reading, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies. They are based on the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS). These core and elective courses prepare students for college and workforce readiness by using a variety of teaching strategies, student activities and assessments.

Pre-Advanced Placement (Pre-AP) courses are designed to provide students with the skills necessary for advanced placement courses in high school. Pre-AP courses typically move at a faster pace, are more academically challenging, and require more independent learning and homework than other courses.



Grading and Testing

Progress reports are sent home to parents/guardians approximately one week after the third and sixth week of each grading period. Report cards are given to students to be shared with parents/guardians at the end of each nine weeks. End-of-the-year report cards are mailed home. Report cards indicate academic progress, citizenship, tardies and attendance. The grades recorded on progress reports and report cards for middle and high school will be numerical averages.

The Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) program is designed to measure the extent to which a student has learned and is able to apply the defined knowledge and skills at the tested grade level. Every TAKS test is directly aligned to the TEKS and is administered at the following grade levels:

IN MIDDLE SCHOOL...

AVID

Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) is a program that begins in middle school and extends through high school. It supports students to ensure success in more academically rigorous courses and maximizes their potential for college.

Promotion

Promotion to the next grade level shall be based on an overall average of 70 or above on a scale of 100 based on course-level, grade-level TEKS standards for all subject areas, and a grade of 70 or above in language arts, mathematics, social studies and science. In addition, students in eighth grade must meet the state testing requirements or be recommended by the Grade Placement Committee in order to be promoted to ninth grade.

High School Curriculum

Core Content Instruction

North East students in grades nine through twelve benefit from comprehensive high school programs or specialized magnet programs, which provide instruction in both foundation and enrichment subjects. The foundation subjects include English Language Arts and Reading, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies and are based on the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS). These core and elective courses prepare students for college and workforce readiness by using a variety of teaching strategies, student activities, and assessments.

Pre-Advanced Placement (Pre-AP) and Advanced Placement (AP) courses are designed to provide students with the skills necessary for advanced placement and college courses. Advanced courses typically move at a faster pace, are more academically challenging, and require more independent learning and homework than other courses.



Grading and Testing

Progress reports are sent home to parents/guardians approximately one week after the third and sixth week of each grading period. Reports cards are given to students to be shared with parents/guardians at the end of each nine weeks; end-of-the-year report cards are mailed home. Report cards indicate academic progress, citizenship, tardies and attendance.

Students participate in the district’s assessment process as part of their instructional program. This assessment process is designed to diagnose students’ strengths and weaknesses, determine instructional effectiveness, guide instructional decisions and identify programmatic strengths and weaknesses. In addition, various types of college readiness assessments are administered. The PSAT is given to all ninth-, tenth-, and eleventh-grade students prior to taking the ACT or SAT college entrance exams.

The Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) program is designed to measure the extent to which a student has learned and is able to apply the defined knowledge and skills at the tested grade level. Every test is directly aligned to the TEKS and is administered at the following grade levels:

11	Exit Level Mathematics, Exit Level English Language Arts, Exit Level Science, Exit Level Social Studies

Promotion

Grade-level advancement for students in grades 9 – 12 shall be earned by course credits. Students must pass their classes as well as all four sections of the exit level TAKS in order to receive a diploma and graduate from a Texas public high school. Students first take the exit level TAKS in the spring of their junior year.

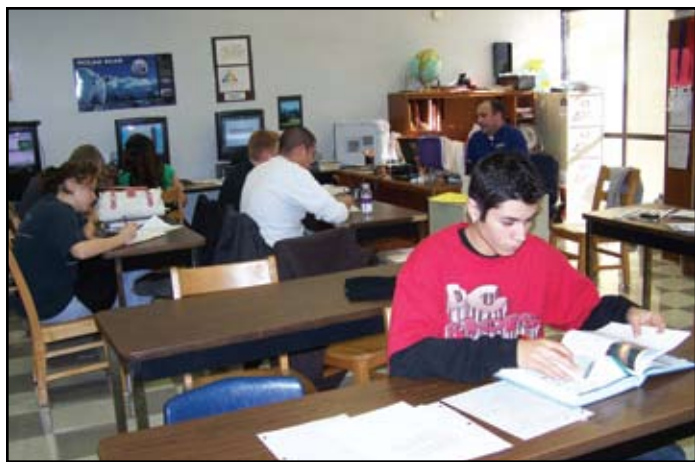

Magnet Programs at NEISD

Magnet schools offer a variety of teaching approaches that help customize a student's educational program through smaller learning environments; in-depth and focused curriculum; specific areas of interest, such as technology or the arts; opportunities for students to discover their talents exploration of students' interests while focusing on strong academic excellence; and support for students' diverse needs.

North East magnet schools emphasize choice, teamwork, student involvement and intellectual ability. They support the district's goal that all students will have the opportunity to acquire the knowledge and skills necessary to realize their potential. Athletics

The mission of the North East ISD Athletic department is to develop a program of competitive athletics that focuses on enhancing student performance. This program will be inclusive of all students who have the desire and ability to participate in University Interscholastic League sports that promote individual and team development.

High school male sports include football, cross country, team tennis, wrestling, basketball, soccer, swimming, baseball, track and field, golf and individual tennis. JROTC

The Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC) includes full credit elective courses that provide classroom instruction combined with the opportunity to serve the school and community, participate in extracurricular activities, social programs, and leadership responsibilities. For students desiring to do so, JROTC may be substituted for the P.E. courses required for graduation.

Curriculum includes topics such as leadership, U.S. military history, personal hygiene, human relations, staff functions and procedures, first aid, military map reading, techniques of oral communications, marksmanship, orienteering, drill and ceremony, and civil defense.

PALs

Peer Assistance and Leadership (PAL) is an elective course offered for one or two years of state credit at the high school level for students who are juniors or seniors. Eighth grade middle school students can also take PAL as an elective. Students receive extensive training in areas such as leadership, communication and mediation. They also participate in community service projects and mentor other students throughout the school year.

Students apply for the PAL program each spring and are selected through a process that includes nominations, application, references and interviews. Selected students represent a cross section of the student body. PAL training includes leadership skills, communication skills, group dynamics, ROPES Challenge course, confidentiality and conflict resolution/mediation.



Career and Technology

Career and Technology Education in North East ISD prepares students to continue academic development and/or enter the job market with the skills necessary for their chosen careers.

Career and Technology Education courses are offered at all middle and high school campuses. Program areas include: Business Education, Family and Consumer Sciences, Health Science Technology, Marketing Education, Technology Education, Trade and Industrial Education, and Career Preparation.

With many of these courses, students are able to earn college credits and work experience while completing their academic requirements.
