Headlights on... Dave Ruhaak

—Another Triumph for Our Marathon Man

Students who take the bus to Bradley Middle School and Hidden Forest Elementary School see a familiar face every day. Dave Ruhaak has been their driver since he moved here from Galveston ten years ago. What many of them may not know is that Dave is also a marathon runner, gearing up for the most famous one of them all, the Boston Marathon.

Several things make Dave remarkable. First off, he is now 66 and didn't actually run his first marathon until he was 40! He has run 20+ marathons since that time, including the Chicago Marathon, the Dallas Marathon, the Houston Marathon and the Galveston Marathon. "I've run the last two several times as I lived locally," says Dave.

What truly sets Dave apart is his desire to help others. He'd actually hung up his training shoes and turned to another passion of his, golf, as he had injured his back some time back with all the running. Then he heard about Kelly Scott, a physical education teacher at Lopez Middle School. She is a breast cancer survivor and wanted to run to commemorate her battle and subsequent victory. Dave told her he'd train with her and one other friend, Jennifer Beudet. Dave never cut the girls any slack on anything. . . Age, aching muscles, running in the extreme cold — there was just never an excuse when it came to running and training.

They ran the 2007 Austin Marathon, training for months beforehand. The three of them finished together hand-in-hand. It was only later the ladies discovered that Dave was hoping to qualify for the Boston Marathon but missed the qualifying time by seven seconds. "That's the kind of guy he is," Kelly enthuses. Dave sees it differently. "It would have been nice to qualify, absolutely, but that wasn't my reason or focus for running the (2007) Marathon. It was to support two incredible ladies."

Dave will have his chance this year with the Boston Marathon (in April) since he qualified in February at the 2008 Austin Marathon. Best of luck Dave!!!

Driver Recognizes Assistant's Knowledge and Response

At approximately 7:50 a.m. a middle school student boarded the bus but began shaking when he reached the third step. He fell to his knees and was aided to his seat by my assistant, Mrs. Laura Moten, where she began to ask him some questions.

Assuming clumsiness on the part of the student, as he had some falling spells where, on one occasion several weeks ago he broke his

right wrist at school, I began to "drive off".

Ms. Laura insisted I stop—she wanted me to back the bus up so she could get off to talk to the student's mom. As they both approached the bus and the student was starting to exit the bus, Ms. Laura sat him down on the steps. He was having a second seizure!

His mom immediately called 911 for help. She stated he had never had seizures be-

fore and was now convinced Ms. Laura was correct in her diagnosis. By the time the ambulance showed, he had had a total of four seizures.

Thanks to Ms Laura's experience and knowledge, added to observation and quick response. She may have alleviated serious injury to the student. I am so honored to have her as my assistant.

Emergency Bus Egress / Evacuation Training Mandated

House Bill 3190 received legislative approval this past August requiring all districts statewide require students, regardless if they are current bus riders, teachers, and other school personnel who travel with students on buses to receive bus evacuation training twice a school year: once each semester.

Susan Torres, Operations Manager, states "Sonny Sturgill, our Safety Specialist, devised a schedule and from Nov 14 through Jan 16 we conducted the first round during the fall semester. 58,546 students and 4,760 campus personnel, using 10-12 buses for an elementary school, 12-15 buses for middle schools and 25-30 to accommodate each high school, were involved."

Arrangements were made where students and the personnel received classroom instruction by viewing a video tape before an evacuation was conducted. Fall semester training included procedures of departing the bus using the front door; identify various safety equipment on the bus, such as the fire extinguisher, first aid and body fluid kits; and how to open and escape from the buses using the side windows, rear door and escape hatches on top of the bus.

"We have already started and completed part of the spring semester training with elementary schools, and this time students will evacuate the buses from the rear door" says Chris O'Connor, Director of Transportation. "We couldn't have done this without the full and outstanding cooperation and cordial hospitality of the campus administration and teachers . . . and we are truly grateful."
