Churchill High School is in the northern suburban area of San Antonio, Texas. A high percentage of the area's residents are college graduates, including business people, professionals, and military personnel. Within the San Antonio area are 5 military bases, 8 colleges or universities, a medical complex with associated medical and health science schools, and a law school.

SCHOOL COMPOSITION

A comprehensive public high school of 2750 students including grades 9-12, Winston Churchill High School is one of seven high schools in the North East Independent School District. The senior class enrollment is 606 students.

CURRICULUM

Our faculty provides a multi-level curriculum, including Advanced Placement, Gifted/Talented, Honors, regular, and developmental courses that give students the opportunity to pursue unique programs that meet their individual needs. In addition to academics, a wide variety of extracurricular activities are available to our students in the areas of Athletics, Band, Choir, Dance, Debate, Journalism, Orchestra, ROTC, Spirit Groups, Theatre and Visual Arts.

Churchill offers 30 AP and 27 Honors courses in the areas of English, Math, Science, Social Studies, World Language, Fine Arts, and Computer Science.

A variety of Career & Technical courses are offered in the areas of Health Science, Human Services, Business, Technology, Engineering, Construction, Architecture, and Video Technology. There are also opportunities for cooperative work programs, clinical rotations, and automotive technology programs.

Churchill, in partnership with San Antonio College, also offers dual credit in English IV, College Algebra, and Theatre Arts.

Churchill High School is accredited by the Texas Education Agency and is a member of the College Board. CEEB Code 446-273.

CLASS OF 2021 PROFILE

The Class of 2021 had 151 Summa Cum Laude graduates, 92 Magna Cum Laude graduates and 92 Cum Laude graduates.

Seventy three percent of Churchill High School graduates were accepted to a post-secondary institution: 51% planned to attend a 4-year institution and 22% planned to attend a 2-year program. Four percent planned to serve in the armed forces.

The Class of 2021 was offered a total of over \$10,920,906.00 in scholarships.

The 2021 Senior Class had 2 National Merit Semi-Finalists, 5 National Merit Commended Scholars and 7 College Board National Recognition Scholars

Students will choose one of five **Endorsement** options: Multidisciplinary Studies, STEM, Business and Industry, Public Services, or Arts and Humanities. Each endorsement requires specific courses, usually 4-5 credits in a concentrated area.

Students may also earn a **Performance Acknowledgment** through Dual Credit, Bilingualism/Biliteracy, Languages Other than English, Advanced Placement, PSAT/SAT/ACT, or a Business Certification or License.

CLASS RANKING

Required graduation courses, up to a maximum of 26 credits, taken in grades 9-12 through the end of the seventh semester will be used to calculate Class Rank. *The following are excluded from rank: courses repeated/taken more than once, high school courses taken in middle school, pass/fail credit classes, courses completed through credit by exam, courses taken in summer foreign study, or with an ARD exemption.*

Weighted rank factors are used to calculate the rank points for each course:

- Advanced Placement (AP): 1.29
- Honors, non-AP Dual Credit & GT: 1.15
- Regular: 1.00

***New ranking for Cohort 2025:

Each student's weighted cumulative average of required classes is used to assign a rank position. A preliminary, unofficial rank is issued after the second and fourth semesters. Students' official rank is issued after the sixth and seventh semesters.

Honor graduates are designated by using the student's 7th semester overall weighted grade point average. Students must be on the Foundation High School Program-Distinguished Level of Achievement to be an honor graduate.
