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### SCHOOL COMPOSITION

A comprehensive public high school, LEE High School is one of seven high schools in the North East Independent School District. The approximate enrollment is 2,650 students with an ethnic composition of 13.66% White-Non-Hispanic, 78.67% Hispanic, 4.45% Black and 1.71% Asian. The 2020 senior class enrollment is approximately 580 students.

Each semester consists of two nine-week grading periods. The total school year is 180 days.

### CURRICULUM

Our faculty provides a multi-level curriculum, including Advanced Placement, Gifted/Talented, Honors, regular, resource, and developmental courses that give students the opportunity to pursue unique programs that meet their individual abilities and needs.

Our school offers 26 AP and 32 Honors courses in the areas of English, Math, Science, Social Studies, Foreign Language, and Fine Arts. Our campus has a partnership with San Antonio College and University of Texas for dual credit and OnRamps courses, respectively.

A variety of Career & Technical courses are offered in the areas of Accounting and Financial Services, Law Enforcement, Health Care, Technology, Culinary Arts, Cosmetology, and Education Training. There are also opportunities for cooperative work programs, practicums in career training, and access to the NEISD Career and Technology Education Center.

Special Programs:

**NESA** - LEE is the host school for the gifted and talented North East School of the Arts which has an emphasis in the arts.

**STEM Academy** – A magnet program for students in NEISD which specializes in advanced studies in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.

**ISA** - The International School of the Americas is a magnet school that is housed on LEE Campus. These students take elective courses at LEE.

## ATTENDANCE

Students are required to be in attendance for at least 90% of each class period per semester in order to receive credit. Excessive absences may result in loss of credit.

## CLASS RANKING

Required graduation courses, up to a maximum of 26 credits, taken in grades 9-12 during the regular school day or in summer school through the end of the seventh semester will be used to calculate Class Rank.

The following are excluded from rank: courses repeated/taken more than once, high school courses taken in middle school, pass/fail credit classes, courses completed through credit by exam, courses taken in summer foreign study, or with an ARD exemption.

Weighted rank factors are used to calculate the rank points for each course:

- Advanced Placement (AP): 1.29
- Honors, non-AP Dual Credit & GT: 1.15
- Regular: 1.00

Each student's weighted cumulative average of required classes is used to assign a rank position. A preliminary, unofficial rank is issued after the second and fourth semesters. Students' official rank is issued after the sixth and seventh semesters.

Honor graduates are designated by using the student's 7th semester overall weighted grade point average. Students must be on the Foundation High School Program-Distinguished Level of Achievement to be an honor graduate.

## GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Students will choose one of five **Endorsement** options: Multidisciplinary Studies, STEM, Business and Industry, Public Services, or Arts and Humanities. Each endorsement requires specific courses, usually 4-5 credits in a concentrated area.

Students may also earn one or more **Performance Acknowledgements** through Dual Credit, Bilingualism or Biliteracy, Languages Other Than English, Advanced Placement, PSAT/SAT/ACT, or a Business Certification or License.

## CLASS OF 2020 PROFILE

The Class of 2020 had 280 honor graduates with 120 Summa Cum Laude, 71 Magna Cum Laude, and 89 Cum Laude. The senior class also had 1 National Merit Commended Scholar and 2 National Hispanic Scholars.

55% of the Class of 2020 enrolled in Advanced Placement, and 18% enrolled in dual credit courses.

73% of LEE 2020 graduates were accepted to a post-secondary institution: 44% planned to attend a 4-year institution and 29% planned to attend a 2-year program. 3% planned to serve in the armed forces.

The Class of 2020 had 92 seniors offered scholarships in the total amount of \$9,163,257. Three seniors also were offered military academy appointments with two accepted.
